Dear Chilwell Families,

Welcome back to all Chilwell Families as we begin our Autumn 2 half term. It is always a busy time of year within school as we focus on ensuring we have our heads down and engage in really purposeful learning. The dark nights are now well and truly upon us and as ever with the pupils so busy in school routines of a good night sleep are even more crucial.

Much excitement has been had in school with the appearance of our onsite swimming pool. Bigger and better than ever, the pool this year has ensured that more formal changing rooms with heating are part of the offer. The well qualified instructors are supporting our Year 6 pupils to achieve the statutory 25 metre swim benchmark by offering daily focused lessons enabling accelerated progress to take place. Additionally, this year we are offering Year 5 after school lessons, and I know that these are already being useful to our pupils.

This week I had a very purposeful meeting with the Chief Executive of the local Legacy Centre of Arts Excellence. Next week is the traditional time that schools focus on anti-bullying, this is such an importance message for all. 



WhatsApp

Users should be at least 13 years old to use WhatsApp. We frequently receive reports of children not using WhatsApp appropriately, such as sharing images to embarrass others, sending hurtful messages, spreading rumours, or excluding people from group chats to make them feel left out.



Since WhatsApp lacks parental controls, it is important to think about whether it is really the right platform for your child. For example, you should consider if your child has the critical thinking skills to recognise bullying. Furthermore, do they understand how to manage peer pressure and refrain from joining in on harmful behaviour?

If your child is using WhatsApp, it is crucial to have regular conversations with them. Talk about who they are chatting with, encourage them to think carefully about the messages they send and how they might be perceived by others. Finally, make sure to model good digital behaviour yourself, as children often learn by observing the adults around them.

What should I be aware of if my child is using WhatsApp?

• Group chats: Everyone within a group, even if they are not one of your child's contacts, will be able to see all messages within that group. If your child is added to a group with someone that they have previously blocked, that person can still see their messages and send them messages within the group chat. If your child is using WhatsApp, check their group privacy settings to see who can add them to groups. Ensure your child understands that they can leave a chat at any time, and they know how to report users. Find out more here:

- Inappropriate content: users can be exposed to content that is not suitable for their age.
- Location sharing: talk to your child about when this would be appropriate to use and the potential danger of sharing their location.
- Chat lock/secret code: users can lock chats as well as apply a secret code setting so a chat does not appear in the main chat.
- Blocking/Reporting: Show your child how to block and report other users. Find out how here: https://faq.whatsapp.com/1142481766359885/

YouTube

YouTube is intended for users over the age of 13, however, younger children can still access YouTube with consent from a parent/legal guardian. When giving your child access to YouTube, there are different options you could choose depending on your child's age:



 YouTube Kids — this is a separate app that includes a smaller selection of videos

based on the age category you select: Preschool (ages 4 and under), Younger (ages 5–8) or Older (ages 9–12).

- Supervised accounts this is a parent-managed version of YouTube that allows you to control the content your child can access. You can select one of the following options:
 - Explore Generally for viewers aged 9+.
 - Explore more Generally for viewers aged 13+
 - Most of YouTube This setting includes almost everything on YouTube except for videos marked as 18+ and other videos that may not be appropriate for viewers using supervised experiences.

Many children want to start their own YouTube channel, but it is important to be aware of the potential risks and ensure that your child understands what information they should keep private and what to do if they receive negative comments. You should be aware that there are different settings available when posting videos:

- 1. Public: anyone can view the video.
- 2. Private: video can only be viewed by users that you select.
- 3. Unlisted: only people who have the link to the video can view it.






GRUMFORT - JAMIE HAMMOND WEEKLY BOOK REVIEW - MISS HAYLES



Reading to Your Child

It might seem like everything has gone digital, but books still play a very important part in school life. As well as giving your child a head start, developing a love for reading.

- · Make book and stories part of everyday life
- · Building a reading story into a routine e.g. a story at bedtime
- · Stick your feet up and let your child see you reading a book
- · Go to the library so your child can choose some books to borrow for free
- Read in fun places e.g. a den made from blankets
- · Give books as a birthday gift this will show you value them
- Keep books in your bag or the car.



Reading Diary Expectations

"Evidence suggests that children who read for enjoyment everyday not only perform better in reading tests than those who don't, but also develop broader vocabulary, increase general knowledge and better understanding of other cultures

In fact, reading for pleasure is more likely to determine whether a child does well at school than their social or economic background" (Pearson, 2021)

Here at Chilwell Croft, we place a high importance on daily reading, each child is provided with a reading diary and books to take home, we ask that the reading records are signed off daily and brought into school where they will be collected in, checked and signed off by an adult. This is a non-negotiable expectation.

Holiday Request

Parents are required, under the Education Act (1996) to ensure children attend school regularly. The Headteacher of a school has a discretionary power to authorise absence only in exceptional circumstances. A family holiday is not an exceptional circumstance.

If you complete a leave of absence request form and the request is declined, (as it will be in the majority of cases) and you still take your child out of school, each parent within the household will potentially be issued with a $\pounds60$ penalty notice for each child you have taken out of school.
